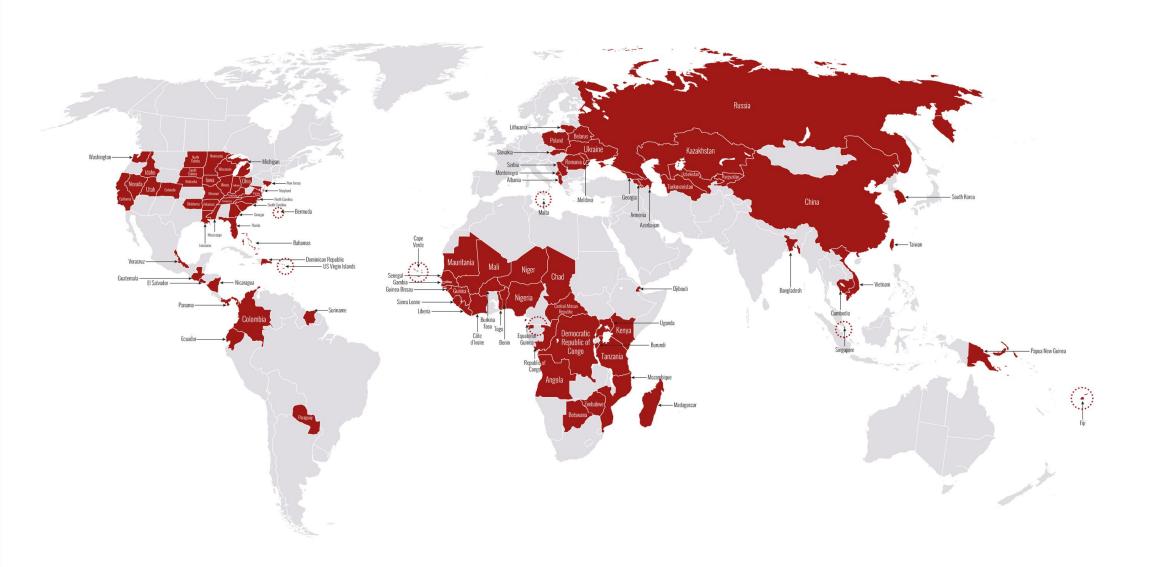

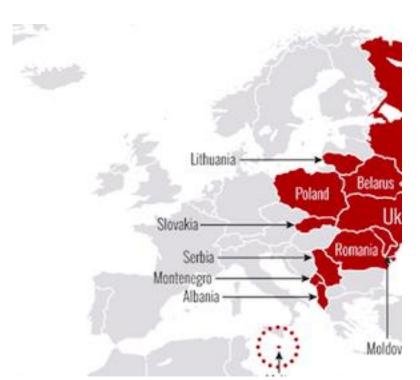
WHERE HIV CRIMINALISATION LAWS EXIST (AS OF APRIL 2016)

Articles 165/166 Slovak Criminal Code (2006)

165 – Intentional HIV exposure (3-10 years)/

Intentional HIV transmission (10-15 years)

166 – Negligent HIV exposure 1-5 years)/

Negligent HIV transmission (4-10 years)

Three prosecutions reported in 2014

(2 female sex workers in 2014, 1 male, 2015)

Malta

Act III of 2002 Criminal Code: Section 244A Chapter 9

"Knowing' disease transmission(4-9 years)

'Careless' disease 'transmission (6 months)

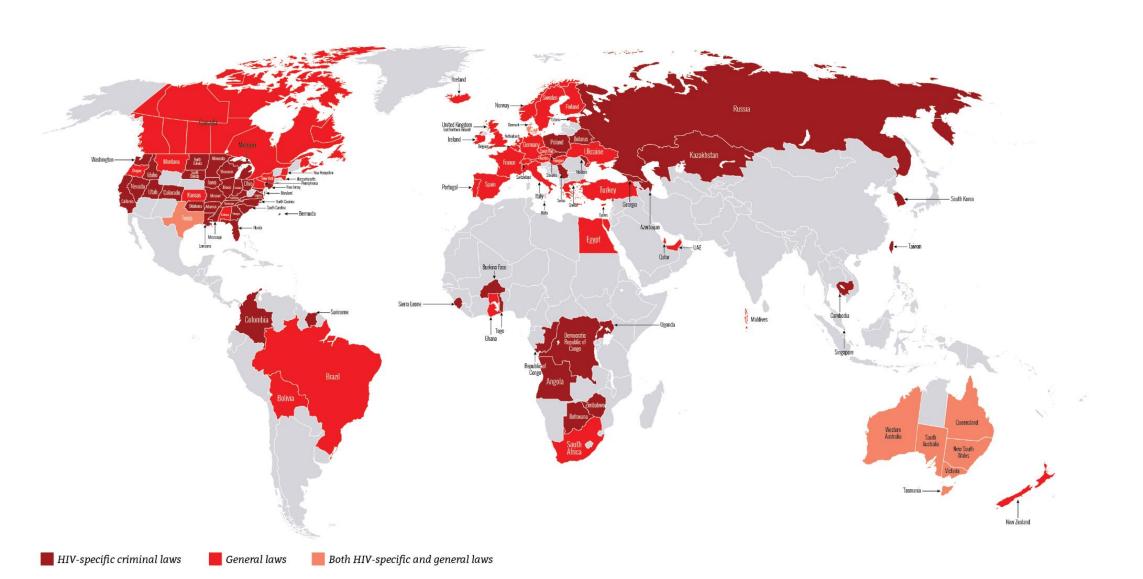
L.N. 137 of 2005 lists the following diseases:

Two HIV cases, one prior to 2002, another in 2009 – neither resulted in convictions

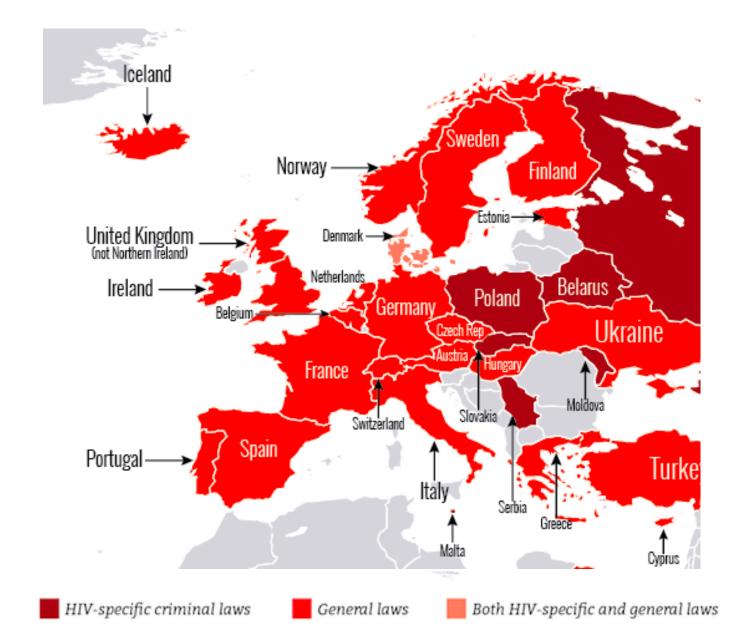
WHERE PROSECUTIONS HAVE EVER TAKEN PLACE (AS OF APRIL 2016)





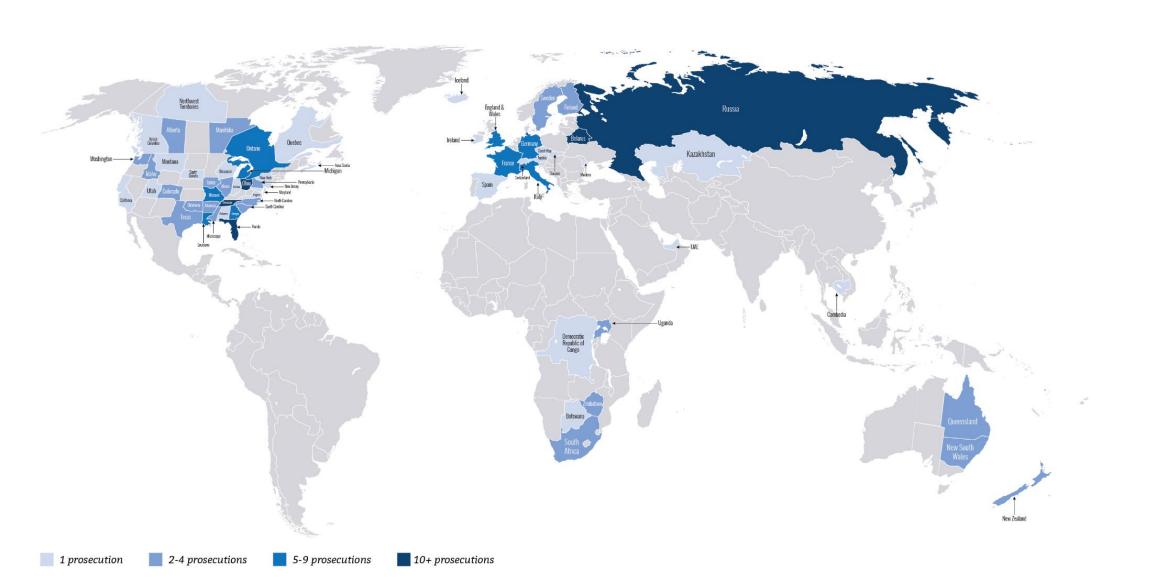
WHERE PROSECUTIONS HAVE EVER BEEN REPORTED IN THE EU (DATA TO END APRIL 2016)





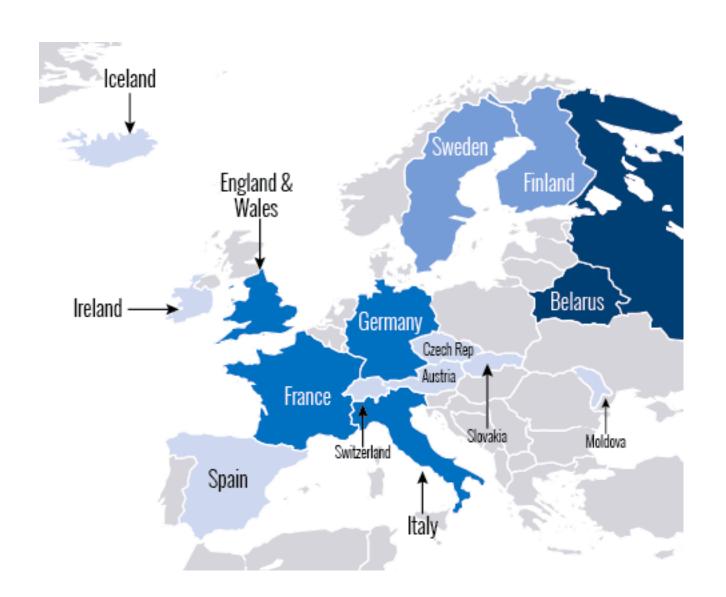
WHERE PROSECUTIONS HAVE RECENTLY TAKEN PLACE (DATA TO THE END OF OCTOBER 2015)

The highest number of cases during this period were reported in:

- Russia (at least 115);
- United States of America (at least 104);
- Belarus (at least 20);
- Canada (at least 17);
- France (at least 7);
- United Kingdom (at least 6);
- Italy (at least 6);
- Australia (at least 5); and
- Germany (at least 5).

WHERE PROSECUTIONS HAVE RECENTLY TAKEN PLACE IN THE EU (JANUARY 2015 – OCTOBER 2016)



The EU countries with the highest number of cases reported during this period were:

Czech Republic (33)

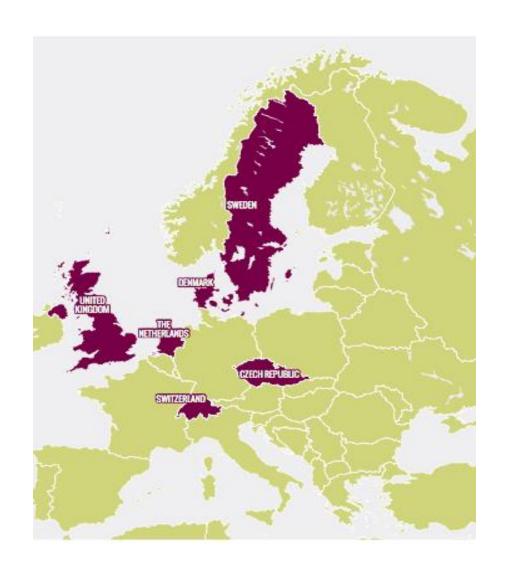
- Prague 30 complaints initiated against gay men with STI diagnoses by Public Health Dept, 20 investigated, 10 ongoing (no convictions yet)
- Two female sex workers arrested (for offering services without disclosure, police press releases)
- Gay man (alleged to have 'exposed' 23 men to HIV, Interpol alert)

United Kingdom (7)

- England and Wales (4): Reckless transmission, conviction (migrant, 7 years) / Spitting, biting with intent, conviction (16 weeks) / Intentional transmission and potentially 'rape' via deliberate condom removal (gay man, ongoing) / Sexual assault with HIV (no verdict).
- Scotland (2): HIV exposure and potentially 'rape' via deliberate condom removal (gay man, ongoing) / HIV exposure to a child via needle (guilty plea, no sentence yet).
- Northern Ireland (1): Biting police officer (5 months)
- Sweden (3): 1 acquittal, 2 suspended sentences, one case headed to Supreme Court.
- Finland (2): 2 acquittals at Supreme Court.
- France (2): 1 appeal upheld, 1 case ongoing
- Belgium (1): HIV exposure (undocumented sex worker, 18 months sentence, deported)
- Germany (1): Aachen Court re-evaluates key 'mens rea' requirement in German law, rules HIV transmission without disclosure is negligent injury, not intentional harm
- Spain (1): Supreme Court upholds nine year sentence for 'reckless' HIV transmission.

AND YET....EUROPE IS THE GLOBAL LEADER IN APPLYING SCIENCE TO JUSTICE





- 2005: Supreme Court of The Netherlands first to limit law based on actual HIV risk.
- 2009: Geneva Court of Justice quashed an HIV 'exposure' conviction following 'Swiss statement'.
- 2011: Denmark' suspended HIV-specific law, due to changes in life expectancy.
- 2011/2: Impact of ART on transmission risk incorporated into England and Wale and Scotland prosecutorial guidelines
- 2013: 'Swedish statement' on sexual HIV risk impacting lower court rulings, clinician practice.
- 2015: Czech Republic Supreme Court considers HIV risk in appeal.

TOWARDS A EUROPEAN MOVEMENT TO END HIV CRIMINALISATION...

NEXT STEPS

- Support ongoing monitoring by HJN. Language capacity in French, Spanish and Russian, as well as English and German.
 Data used by GNP+, UNAIDS and many others.
- Focus on EU countries with HIV-specific criminal laws, especially EU Presidency countries (Slovakia/Malta)
- Focus on where HIV-related prosecutions / HIV stigma intersects with stigma and discrimination against other key populations (gay men, sex workers, people who use drugs, migrants, prisoners)
- Focus on bringing science to justice (UNAIDS/IAS/IAPAC/HJWW Global Consensus Statement)
- Focus on whole genome sequencing in phylogenetics / broadening concepts of 'rape'
